Historic flooding

The historic Halloween weekend flood of 2015 brought 17.44 inches of rain to Kyle between Oct. 30-31, according to Parks Director Kerry Urbanowicz, who tracks rainfall totals. He said that is the most 24-48 hour rainfall in Kyle in 35 years.

Raindrops began falling at about 5:45 a.m. last Friday morning - the ground was already saturated with moisture. Within a few hours, record amounts of water fell from the sky. Residents across Kyle that had never experienced flooding were suddenly watching water rush up to their doors and in many cases, inside their homes and vehicles.

Heavy rain affected many neighborhoods throughout Kyle.

Water came into City Hall, which was acting as a shelter for those in need. Our Parks & Recreation Department headquarters near Lake Kyle was completely flooded. Several city vehicles sustained water damage.

The city's administrative arm, along with its communications team, worked throughout the weekend, providing information to Kyle residents on clean up efforts and flood recovery resources.

Our Public Works and Parks crews worked tirelessly all week hauling off water logged furniture, matresses, carpet, and construction materials from flood impacted homes. TDS emptied the five dumpsters placed around the city multiple times.

Within 96 hours, nearly all of the post-flood clean up was complete.

Flood survivor resources

Several hundred flood survivors received information about assistance from various agencies and nonprofits. They attended the Hays County Survivor Resource Center held Nov. 3-5 in Kyle. What do people need after a disaster? According to Mike Jones the Hays County Emergency Preparedness Coordinator, some

don't know what they need. "Many people want assistance for something they don't know how to deal with," he said.

In addition to information about housing needs and reconstruction help, Jones said survivors could also seek emotional support to deal with their grief.
