I. Call Meeting to Order

Mayor Mitchell called the meeting to order at 7:07 p.m. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Mayor Mitchell asked the city secretary to call roll.

Present were: Mayor Mitchell, Mayor Pro Tem Rizo, Council Member Ellison, Council Member Flores-Cale, Council Member Bradshaw, Council Member Parsley, and Council Member Tobias. A quorum was present.

II. Approval of Minutes

1. City Council Special Meeting Minutes - April 5, 2022. ~ Jennifer Holm, City Secretary

Council Member Tobias moved to approve the minutes of the April 5, 2022 Special Council Meeting. Mayor Pro Tem Rizo seconded the motion. Motion carried 7-0.

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III. Citizen Comment Period with City Council

Mayor Mitchell opened citizen comments at 7:08 p.m.

Diana Woods was called to speak as registered in opposition of Item Nos. 30 and 31. She spoke about attending a public hearing before the Planning and Zoning Commission. She spoke about the contractor having trespassed onto her property to erect a permanent iron stake, inside her fence which was damaged, and removed the surveyor's land marker. She stated that it would be improper for the Council to approve the annexation without addressing the alteration of the metes and bounds.

Alexander Villalobos was called to speak as registered. He spoke about Mr. Armando Chapa and the advocacy, education, guidance and mark that he impressed on his community.

Jason Cale was called to speak as registered. He spoke about the city manager's outside employment, former Council Member Rick Koch, the endorsement of the business by Mayor Mitchell, and council spending by Council Members Koch and Bradshaw and Mayor Mitchell. He continued about actions of former Council Member Rick Koch with regard to the appointment of a Planning & Zoning Commissioner, and the Brick and Mortar District. He spoke about the sale of Mayor Mitchell's commercial property and made many accusations of lack of integrity.

Kay Rush, representing Amberwood, was called to speak as registered regarding Item No. 34. She spoke about Monarch as the water provider for Amberwood. She spoke about cost differences between City of Kyle water customers and Monarch customers. She spoke about a 3% raise that is in agenda packet. She asked why the chart doesn't consider the cost of distribution, the cost of water, the cost of doing business in water, who Monarch receives water from, and what their cost is. She asked whether the City bases its water rates on costs for meals at restaurants, costs of shoes and clothing, because she stated, these items are considered in her water rate with Monarch. She thanked council for approving item numbers 11, 12, and 13 in the agreement, which they have requested for many years. She stated that Monarch is guaranteed a net 5.8% increase.

Gabe Parsley was called to speak as registered in regarding Item No. 24. He stated that his topic is to bring more financial transparency and scrutiny on expenditures by the City Council and senior members. He provided totals for each council member's expenses over the last five years. He asked that stringent oversight of all elected officials must be enacted immediately, and all expenditures be made plainly available to the taxpayers who are footing the bill.

Jo Fenety was called to speak as registered in opposition of Item No. 34. She spoke about the Monarch contract. She asked that Council think about the amount of money that is okay to have citizens pay for water. She stated that the City had the opportunity to purchase the water utility in 2006 and didn't, and now must negotiate contracts. She stated the amount is not quite as fair as it should be.

Jeremy Garrett, representing KAP Literary Center, was called to speak as registered. He serves as the writer-in-residence for the Literary Center. He wanted to remind Council and local community that the arts and literary arts have been long represented in the City. Mr. Garrett spoke about the accomplishments and events held over the last 22 years. He spoke about a national PBS broadcast that took place yesterday evening from Kyle regarding the healing power of arts. He stated that this Friday, April 22 at 7:30 p.m., Joy Harjo would be hosting a poetry event.

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Lila Knight, representing Hays County Historical Commission, was called to speak as registered. She spoke about the Commission's previous survey of historical buildings in Kyle having taken place in 1994 and went back to 1945. She stated that the Commission will soon be resurveying the buildings of Kyle. They plan to finish by the end of the year and will provide a copy of the report to the City.

Mario Perez was called to speak as registered. He commented on Item No. 39, Savannah Ranch Development. He spoke about the requirements for a reinvestment zone and stated that Savannah Ranch is not appropriate for a reinvestment zone because it is clearly not a blight area. He described this area as the most prime development land in Kyle that can accommodate luxury real estate.

With no one else wishing to speak, Mayor Mitchell closed citizen comments at 7:36 p.m.

Public Hearing

Daniel McElrath spoke about the survey issue.

Mayor Mitchell opened the public hearing at 10:11 p.m.

Diane Woods stated that the iron stake that was placed on her property was removed by herself. She stated that she is not opposed to growth and houses and development but encouraged Council to explore the Central Appraisal District's interactive maps. She stated that her professional floodplain engineer did an independent review for the Mansions of Buda as it ties into Porter Country and there is a portion of floodplain that the City would be assuming with this annexation. She stated that the location of the roadway connecting to Porter Country is creating a barrier and backflow. She stated that her engineer has opined that the barrier would be created for her property and the one next to her. She urged Council to look at the map and consider delay. She spoke about the 2015 floods, the volume of water being the particular section where Mansions of Buda is attempting to cross. She stated that Mr. McElrath has been very kind and answered her questions, but she has concerns about the level of water that will be created by the barrier. Ms. Woods stated that the engineer believes it can provide a backflow problem for the for her, her neighbor and the City's trail system. Council Member Ellison asked whether her consultant offered an alternative recommendation. She stated that the engineer felt like an elevated bridge rather than culverts is necessary. Ms. Woods continued that the deal-breaker for her is the roadway and the disturbance the other developer has made with the metes and bounds. She urged Council to look at the FEMA maps. She stated there is a side of the flood plain that comes through porter country on the east side of her property and floodplain to the west of her property on the other side of her neighbors and they come together just beyond her property, going in that direction, and is collecting all the way from Stonebridge subdivision under Hillside Terrace, through the RV Park, through the retention pond. She stated that it is her understanding that other retention ponds are planned for the other side. The placing of the roadway between the two developments will create a barrier and possibly a backflow issue. She stated that her engineer is very familiar with the area, and he believes culverts will not work. Council Member Flores-Cale asked whether she had looked at the survey. She stated that her engineer stated that it appeared the surveyor was placing stakes for the roadway. She stated that what is on the ground leads her to believe there is a change in the lines.

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With no one else wishing to speak, Mayor Mitchell closed the public hearing at 10:22 p.m.
